



## IAAF DIAMOND LEAGUE MEETINGS 2013 STATUS REQUIREMENTS AND REGULATIONS

### 1. General Principles

- 1.1 The IAAF Diamond League shall include the best invitational outdoor athletics meetings of the world.
- 1.2 During these events, the IAAF Diamond League and IAAF Rules, Regulations and Guidelines will apply unless specifically stated within these Regulations.
- 1.3 The Meeting Director agrees to respect any rules, regulations and decision taken by the General Assembly of the Diamond League AG.
- 1.4 The precise requirements are defined hereunder.
- 1.5 At least one person from the National Federation, selected in agreement with the Organising Committee, must be co-opted onto the Organising Committee for the purposes of liaison.
- 1.6 The following meetings compose the IAAF Diamond League in 2013:

- 1.7 Formal Applications for the IAAF Status shall be submitted to the IAAF,
  - on the appropriate form,
  - countersigned by the Meeting Director and the National Federation,
  - by the deadline set by the IAAF.
- 1.8 No application shall be considered if the requirements were not met in 2012 and are not guaranteed for 2013.

## **2. Evaluation & reporting**

- 2.1 All IAAF Diamond League Meetings will undergo an annual evaluation on all aspects of their organisation following the system agreed by the Diamond League AG:
  - level of the athletes competing,
  - attendance of spectators,
  - respect of these regulations,
  - respect of all other IAAF and Diamond League regulations (such as Television Production and Graphic Branding Guidelines),
  - respect of the financial commitments towards the athletes,
  - conduct of anti-doping measures,
  - technical conduct of the competition,
  - services provided to the athletes,
  - Diamond League concept and office support
  - media services.
- 2.2 The status can be cancelled according to procedures agreed by the Diamond League General Assembly.
- 2.3 The Technical and Anti-doping Delegates nominated by the IAAF as well as any other Delegates nominated by the SDL AG for the Meetings, shall be ready to give assistance to the Organiser and the Organiser shall guarantee full co-operation with the Delegates.
- 2.4 Following each Meeting, the Meeting Director and the designated Delegates shall, each, be required to complete a detailed Report form concerning the staging of the Meeting and return this form to IAAF no later than 10 days after the Meeting
- 2.5 A copy of the Reports received by IAAF will also be given to the Meeting Director concerned.

## **3. Minimum Requirements for Application**

### **3.1 Minimum standards of organisation**

The observation and respect of the applicable IAAF Diamond League and IAAF Rules, Regulations and Guidelines shall always be one of the minimum requirements. If a Meeting does not satisfy the minimum requirements for the previous season's status, the IAAF retains the right not to deliver a permit, to downgrade the meeting and/or request the Board of Diamond League to impose penalties.

### 3.2 Stadium and Technical Aspects

### 3.3 Programme of the IAAF Diamond League Meetings

- a. The list of disciplines at each meeting is decided by the Diamond League General Assembly.
- b. The programme of any IAAF Diamond League Meeting is composed by 16 Diamond Races. Additional disciplines chosen by the Meeting Directors and approved by the IAAF Diamond League General Assembly may complement the main programme. Each Meeting's programme shall be published on [www.diamondleague.com](http://www.diamondleague.com).
- c. The 32 events of the IAAF Diamond League 2013/2014 are as follows:  
Men: 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m, 1500m, 5000m, 10000m, 3000mSC, 110mH, 400mH, High Jump, Pole Vault, Long Jump, Triple Jump, Shot Put, Discus Throw, Javelin Throw  
Women: 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m, 1500m, 5000m, 10000m, 3000mSC, 100mH, 400mH, High Jump, Pole Vault, Long Jump, Triple Jump, Shot Put, Discus Throw, Javelin Throw
- d. Each of the 32 disciplines is staged seven times within the Diamond League structure.
- e. The programme is mandatory; disciplines cannot conflict with those being staged by another meeting of the IAAF Diamond League, within 3 days before or after unless both meetings agree the latest 30 days in advance. The final decision on any arbitration remains with the nominated member of the Board and General Coordinator of the IAAF Diamond League.
- f. To achieve this goal the Meetings Organisers may express their wishes but the allocation will be done by the General Assembly of the IAAF Diamond League.
- g. In middle distance events, similar events can be organised. The scores of the races at:
  - 1000m shall count towards the 800m
  - Mile or 2000m shall count towards the 1500m

- 2 miles, 3000m or 10,000m shall count towards the 5000m

- h. Any proposal of change made to the programme must be immediately notified by the Meeting Director to the General Coordinator of the IAAF Diamond League and the General coordinator of the IDL will immediately notify the IAAF and other Meeting Directors.

### 3.4 Participation Field

- a. Although Meeting Directors are not required to invite any particular Athletes or groups of Athletes to their Meetings, the recommendations listed under 3.4.b concerning the Athletes' participation apply.
- b. Where applicable, the Meeting Director should allow at least one starting place in each event for national Athletes, one for the Diamond Race winner of the previous season and places for athletes leading the Diamond Race tables.

### 3.5 Prize Money at IAAF Diamond League Meetings

- a. Each IAAF Diamond League Meeting has the obligation to award the following Prize Money for each of the defined IAAF Diamond League events (total US Dollars 30,000)

1st	10,000
2nd	6,000
3rd	4,000
4th	3,000
5th	2,500
6th	2,000
7th	1,500
8th	1,000

For all race events of 1500m and plus the 9th to 12th places are additionally awarded with 500 US Dollars each (total Prize Money for these races: 32.000 US Dollars each).

- b. In the case of a tie for the same position the prize money corresponding to the position will be divided into equal shares between the athletes tying for this position.
- c. The minimum bonus awarded for breaking a World Record is US Dollars 50,000.
- d. Prize Money and promotional fees must be paid 30 days after the receipt of the IAAF's notification that there has been no adverse analytical finding in the doping controls of samples taken at the meeting and the receipt of an invoice from the Athletes' Representative.

- e. Upon request of the IAAF and/or the Diamond League AG, a Meeting Director shall provide, within two weeks, all proof of the payment he made according to these regulations but also to the deals signed by the athletes (or their representatives).

### 3.6 Scoring at the IAAF Diamond League Event

- a. The top three Athletes in each event shall be awarded the same amount of points at each meeting with the exception of the Final where the points are doubled.

Scoring	Points	
1st place	4 points	(Final Zurich & Brussels: 8 points)
2nd place	2 points	(Final Zurich & Brussels: 4 points)
3rd place	1 point	(Final Zurich & Brussels: 2 points)

- b. In the case of a tie for the same position, the points will not be divided between the tying athletes, but each tying athlete will receive the full amount of points corresponding to the place.
- c. Athlete with the highest number of points in each event at the end of the IAAF Diamond League season wins the Diamond Race. In the case of a tie, the athlete with the highest number of 1st places shall be considered the winner, if there still is a tie, the better result in the Final shall determine the winner.
- d. The participation in good faith at the Final is compulsory in order to win the Diamond Race.

### 3.7 Medical

All meetings of the IAAF Diamond League shall have

- an emergency medical structure and ambulance on site, including resuscitation and minor suturing
- physiotherapy at the stadium and in the athletes' hotel

### 3.8 Anti-Doping

- a. The latest version of the IAAF Anti-Doping Regulations and the IAAF Procedural Guidelines for Doping Control are to be strictly observed.
- b. The facilities available at the doping control station must meet the following minimum requirements and the Meet Organiser guarantees the transport of the controlled athletes.
- c. The minimum number of controls to be conducted is 12 of which 4 must be EPO tests. Additional tests shall be conducted:
  - systematically when an Athlete breaks or equals a World and/or an Area Record (if more than one athlete breaks or equals the record in the same event, then all athletes concerned must be tested);

- when requested by any Athlete who has broken a National Record.
- d. The samples shall be analysed by a WADA accredited laboratory designated by the IAAF:
  - at the Organisers' expenses when the doping controls are conducted at the IAAF's request and in case of a World or Area Record;
  - at the Athlete's expenses, if the control is made at his/her request.
- e. Doping Controls for men and women have to be conducted in separated rooms.
- f. Athletes having to undergo doping control have to be provided with dedicated transport.
- g. EPO testing shall be conducted in accordance with the IAAF EPO Protocol.
- h. If the sample indicates the presence of a substance from the current WADA prohibited list, the athlete concerned shall be informed through his National Federation in accordance with the "test results management procedure". The Athlete will not be allowed to compete provisionally in further competitions until the resolution of the case as appropriate.

### 3.9 Media

The services to be provided to the press and photographers must comply with the "IAAF Media Guidelines" as well as IAAF Diamond League Regulations. As regards media tribune facilities, result service and Internet, as well as press conferences, the following minimum requirements will have to be met:

### 3.10 Television

- a. The international TV rights for the IAAF Diamond League are marketed by IMG.
- b. Television production and service to broadcasters will have to comply with IAAF Diamond League TV Production Guidelines.
- c. Broadcast (60 minutes minimum) is compulsory in the host country.
- d. Each meeting / host broadcaster will have to provide IMG and the Diamond League AG with a professional quality tape or DVD of the competition.

- 3.11 Logistics  
Meeting headquarters hotel and transport facilities to be provided by the Meeting Director must comply with the following:

- 3.12 IAAF Delegates and Staff  
IAAF Delegates and Staff attending the meeting shall be given full co-operation and support as defined in the respective agreements.
- 3.13. Insurance  
Meeting Directors must sign a liability insurance policy, in favour of the athletes, officials and spectators, to cover risks for which they may be retained liable. Another insurance policy should be signed against the risks of cancellation. Athletes have to cover their own insurance for accident.
- 3.14 Marketing and other rights  
The Meeting Director and Diamond League AG guarantee to abide to the agreements between Diamond League AG and IAAF with regards to all marketing and other rights granted to the IAAF.

#### **4. Entry of Athletes into IAAF Diamond League Meetings**

- 4.1 The participation of athletes in an IAAF Diamond League Meeting is at the discretion of the Meeting Director concerned. However, the invitations are subject to the compliance with rules and procedures agreed by the General Assembly of the Diamond League AG.
- 4.2 The first three in the Diamond Race ranked athletes shall be guaranteed a starting place in their respective discipline at the Final.

#### **5. Technical**

- 5.1 Meeting Directors have to make available the provisional Entry List and Timetable on at least seven days before the meeting.
- 5.2 The Meeting Director is also recommended to stage a Technical Meeting in the afternoon the day before the competition
- 5.3 After the Technical Meeting, the Meeting Directors have to make available the Start List on [www.diamondleague.com](http://www.diamondleague.com) and they should be sent to the IAAF, [iaafmeetingresults@hq.iaaf.org](mailto:iaafmeetingresults@hq.iaaf.org), as well. The start list should be published and sent to the IAAF, [iaafmeetingresults@hq.iaaf.org](mailto:iaafmeetingresults@hq.iaaf.org), the day before the competitions, if there is no Technical Meeting.

The Start List should include  
- Event

- Athlete's Surname and Name
- Athlete's Country Code
- Athlete's Date/Year of Birth

In the disciplines where the organisers stage more heats, the distribution of the Athletes must be detailed.

- 5.4 The results will be made available online immediately after the conclusion of each event. At the same time they shall be sent to the IAAF, [iaafmeetingresults@hq.iaaf.org](mailto:iaafmeetingresults@hq.iaaf.org).

The results should include:

- Event
- Athlete's Position
- Athlete's Surname and Name
- Athlete's Country Code
- Athlete's Mark
- Wind: 100m, 200m, 100H/110mH
- Wind at each trial: LJ and TJ
- Trials: HJ, PV, SP, DT, HT, JT

- 5.5 For the events from 100m to 800m inclusive, the allocation of lanes will be at the Meeting Directors' discretion, who will take into consideration current performances and local conditions.

- 5.6 The competition order of the field events will be at the discretion of the organisers.

- 5.7 The maximum size of fields (including pace makers) should be as follows:

800m	11 Athletes	(if 9 lanes: 12 Athletes)
1500m	15 Athletes	
3000m	18 Athletes	
5000m	20 Athletes	
3000m SC	6 Athletes	
10,000m	26 Athletes	
Field events	12 Athletes	





## **IAAF WORLD CHALLENGE REGULATIONS 2013**

*(Approved November 2012)*

### **1. General Principles**

- 1.1 Every year the IAAF shall grant an IAAF World Challenge (IWC) Permit label to top athletics Meetings around the world.
- 1.2 Regulations governing the conduct of IAAF World Challenge Meetings shall be issued to the World Challenge Meeting Organisers (the Organiser) and may be amended every year by the IAAF.

### **2. Calendar of Events**

- 2.1 There shall be a maximum of sixteen (16) IWC Meetings each year with no more than seven (7) Meetings from any one Area. The Calendar of approved IWC Meetings for 2013 is included in Appendix 1.
- 2.2 Dates of IWC Meetings will be decided and approved by the IAAF in coordination with the Organiser and the respective Area Associations. All provisions will be taken in order to avoid a clash of dates with Diamond League Meetings, other IWC Meetings and the relevant Area Calendar.
- 2.3 The dates of IWC Meetings must respect the following minimum window between a Diamond League Meeting and an IWC Meeting:
  - 1 full day when held in the same Area
  - 2 full days when held between different Areas
- 2.4 The programme of events of an IWC Meeting should not clash with the programme of a Diamond League and/or the IWC Meeting which is scheduled to be held just before or just after the Meeting in question (see also 6.1 and 6.5).

### **3. Applications/Permit**

- 3.1 An Application for an IAAF World Challenge Permit shall be sent by the IAAF to the Organiser prior to the season.
- 3.2 The Organiser shall submit the Application by the indicated date to the IAAF duly completed:
  - countersigned by the IAAF Member Federation;
  - countersigned by the Area Association acknowledging the date and programme of the Meeting.
- 3.3 The IAAF shall have sole right to approve or reject an application.
- 3.4 An application may not be considered if the World Challenge Requirements were not met during the two last seasons or are not guaranteed in the application (see also 8.4).
- 3.5 Should the Application be accepted by the IAAF, the Organiser must sign a contract with the IAAF in which the duties and rights of all parties are listed.

- 3.6 An evaluation system (see 8) will be implemented within the IWC. Unless otherwise decided by the IAAF, only meetings with a current Area Permit will be considered for an upgrade to IWC status.

#### **4 Meeting Organiser Obligations/Requirements**

##### **4.1 Athletes**

- 4.1.1 Participation at IWC Meetings is strictly at the discretion of the Organiser.
- 4.1.2 The Organiser may conduct negotiations for the appearance and promotion of Athletes as follows:
- a) through the Athletes' Member Federation
  - b) through duly authorised Athletes' Representatives (AR)
  - c) directly with the Athletes, if the Athlete doesn't have an AR.
- 4.1.3 A complete listing of authorised ARs is available from the IAAF website or from the IAAF HQ: <http://www.iaaf.org/aboutiaaf/structure/athletes/index.html>
- 4.1.4 Sanctions may be applied to the Organiser if negotiations are not conducted according to the above-mentioned procedure.

##### **4.2 IAAF Delegates/IAAF Staff**

- 4.2.1 The IAAF shall appoint a Technical Delegate with the required technical knowledge to attend the event, who will serve as its official representative.
- 4.2.2 The Organiser shall be responsible for the Delegates travel costs based on economy class for flights of 2500km or less and business class for flights of more than 2500km.
- 4.2.3 The Organiser shall be responsible for full-board accommodation at the Meeting hotel for a maximum three nights for the IAAF Technical Delegate, and if appointed, for the Advertising Commissioner, Doping Delegate and two IAAF Staff members.
- 4.2.4 The Organiser shall provide the IAAF with a minimum of five (5) VIP tickets to the event.

##### **4.3 Technical Requirements**

###### **4.3.1 Stadium and Technical Aspects**

- 4.3.2 An IWC Meeting shall normally be staged over one day and at one venue. If the Organiser wishes to stage any field events outside the main competition stadium, approval of the IAAF must be granted in advance.

- 4.3.3 For the results of any event held outside the stadium to be recognised, the following conditions according to Rule 149 must be met:
- A confirmation from the federation that a permit had been issued
  - A confirmation from the federation regarding NTOs, equipment and implements if applicable
  - The part of the IAAF Measurement Report Form relating to the event site in question with all necessary attachments (instrument certificate, levels) based on actual measurements taken on the day of the event. These documents (measurement report, levels form) are available on the IAAF website.
- 4.3.4 At least three days before the Meeting, the Organiser shall provide the IAAF with the provisional Entry List and the Timetable.
- 4.3.5 The Organiser is recommended to stage a Technical Meeting on the eve of the competition. Immediately following the Technical Meeting, the Organiser must send the final Start Lists to the IAAF HQ. If there is no Technical Meeting, the Start Lists should be sent as soon as available, and no later than the evening prior to the Meeting. The information must be sent to the IAAF by:

- 4.3.6 The Organiser shall send the official results to the IAAF immediately after the conclusion of each event and not at the end of the entire programme. The Organiser must also ensure that the IAAF is informed of any correction to the Results.
- 4.3.7 For 100m to 800m events inclusive, the allocation of lanes will be at the Organiser's discretion, taking into consideration current performances and local conditions.
- 4.3.8 Competing order of the Field events shall be at the discretion of the Organiser.
- 4.3.9 The maximum size of fields (including pace makers) should not exceed:

#### 4.4 Medical and Anti-Doping

- 4.4.1 The Organiser shall provide:
- adequate Medical and Emergency Services on site, including emergency assistance and ambulance service, and minor stitching.
  - physiotherapy facilities at the stadium and at the Athletes' hotel
- 4.4.2 The Organiser shall carry out doping controls strictly in accordance with the IAAF Rules and Regulations as follows:
- A minimum of 12 controls must be conducted, of which at least 4 must be analysed for EPO.
  - EPO testing shall be conducted in accordance with the IAAF EPO Protocol.
  - If the sample indicates the presence of a substance on the current WADA Prohibited List, the athlete concerned shall be informed through his National Federation in accordance with the "test results

management procedure". It is to be noted that the athlete in question shall not be allowed to compete if provisionally suspended.

- d) Additional tests shall be conducted:
  - systematically when an Athlete breaks or equals a World and/or an Area Record (if more than one athlete breaks or equals the record in the same event, then all athletes concerned must be tested); athletes breaking the record in running events must also be analysed for EPO;
  - when requested by any Athlete who has broken a National Record.
- e) The IAAF may decide to conduct pre-competition blood testing at its own expense.
- f) The samples shall be analysed by a WADA Accredited Laboratory designated by the IAAF:
  - at the expense of the Organiser when the doping controls are conducted at the request of the IAAF, and in case of a World or Area Record;
  - at the Athlete's expense, if the control is made at his/her request.

## **5. General Requirements**

5.1 The Organiser must be the National Federation or a Member of the National Federation, and must agree to abide by the Rules and Regulations of the IAAF. At least one person from the National Federation, selected in agreement with the Organising Committee, must be co-opted onto the Organising Committee for liaison purposes.

5.2 The Organiser shall obtain liability insurance which covers eventual claims made by athletes, officials and/or spectators. Another insurance policy should be taken out against the risks of cancellation of the Meeting.

### **5.3 Media**

The services to be provided to the press and photographers must comply with the IAAF Media Guidelines. The following minimum requirements must be met:

- Tribune Dedicated seats
- Equipment TV monitors (recommended) + Telephone
- Results service Individual
- Internet / Web Meeting website with Start Lists and Results Summary
- Press releases Regularly (4 minimum)
- Photographers WIFI or internet access via phone lines should be for photos to be wired quickly from stadium Media working area. High speed and large capacity internet access via WIFI or land lines for the purpose of quick upload and sending of digital photographs from the stadium Media working area
- Press conferences A minimum of 2
- Media Stand 3 places for IAAF representatives (including 2 ADSL high-speed internet connections)

### **5.4 Television**

5.4.1 Television production and service to broadcasters shall comply with the IAAF Broadcast Guidelines.

5.4.2 Live broadcast, or a delayed broadcast within 60 minutes, is compulsory, at least in the host country.

5.4.3 Each Meeting shall provide the IAAF with a broadcast quality tape (DVcam, XDcam, HDcam or DigiBeta) of the entire coverage of the

competition and allow the IAAF to use up to five minutes of footage for promotional purposes, free of charge. The tape should be received by IAAF within one week of the competition.

#### 5.5 Logistics

Meeting headquarters hotel and transport facilities to be provided by the Organiser must comply with the following minimum requirements:

- Hotel rating 3 star (\*\*\*)
- Athletes transportation to/from hotel, stadium, airport, train station
- Delegates Pool cars
- Poles Transport and storage

#### 5.6 Advertising

The Organiser shall respect the IAAF Advertising Regulations.

#### 5.7 Promotion

5.7.1 The IAAF World Challenge Permit Logo will be displayed on the event website and on all printed and promotional material.

5.7.2 One IAAF infield board and one IAAF perimeter board will be displayed in prime position in the main TV configuration (layout provided by the IAAF and production provided by the Organiser).

5.7.3 A one page advertisement for the IAAF will be provided in the Official Programme (see Appendix 1).

### 6. **Programme of Events**

6.1 Organisers must stage a minimum of 15 events. Included in the 15 events will be a core group of 11 or 12 events (see 6.2). The IAAF will assign the core group of events for each IWC Meeting. The event group will be assigned taking into consideration the Diamond League and IWC calendars.

6.2. There will be three core groups of events divided as follows:

Organisers may exchange any of the above events between themselves.

6.3 Hammer Throw events included as a core event or a discretionary event will be included as part of the IAAF World Hammer Throw Challenge.

6.4 In middle distance events, similar events can be organised such as:

- 800m: 1000m
- 1500m: Mile or 2000m
- 3000m: 2 miles, 5000m or 10,000m

6.5 The Organiser must include the events of its assigned core group and thereafter it will have the discretion to add further events (minimum 3 for Group A and 4 for Groups B and C), subject to the conditions below:

- a) The discretionary events will be approved by the IAAF taking into consideration and trying to avoid a conflict of events to be staged by Diamond League and other IWC meetings;
- b) Should a conflict arise, the final decision shall be taken by the IAAF.

- 6.6 The Organiser has the obligation to immediately notify the IAAF of any requested change in the approved programme such change being subject to approval by the IAAF.
- 6.7 The Organiser shall make every effort to stage the main programme within two and a half (2.5) consecutive hours.

## 7. Awards

- 7.1 A minimum total prize money structure of US Dollars 200,000 shall be offered for each IWC Meeting.

- 7.2 The following minimum amounts (USD) must be offered for each event:

- 7.3 For middle distance races (1500m and over), an award of 300 US Dollars shall be provided to all Athletes finishing in places 9 through 12.
- 7.4 The prize money structure for each Meeting shall be published on the official Meeting website no later than 20 days prior to the competition.
- 7.5 Bonuses for breaking a World Record shall be at the discretion of the Organiser.
- 7.6 Prize Money shall be paid within 30 days upon receipt of the doping control results from the IAAF and an invoice from the Athletes' Representative.
- 7.7 Upon request from the IAAF, an Organiser has the obligation to provide within two weeks, proof of the payments made to the athletes.

## 8. Evaluation & Reporting

- 8.1 All IWC Meetings will undergo an annual evaluation on various aspects of the organisation. Each Meeting will be evaluated according to the following eight criteria:
- Participation Level
  - Spectators
  - Television Coverage
  - Technical Conduct
  - Advertising
  - Prize Structure/Payments
  - Medical / Anti-doping
  - Logistics (Transport, Accommodation, Meals)

The IAAF World Challenge Meeting Evaluation Criteria document can be found in Appendix 2.

- 8.2 Following each Meeting, the Meeting Director and the IAAF Delegate(s) shall be required to complete a detailed Report Form concerning the staging of the Meeting and return this form to the IAAF no later than 10 days after the Meeting. The analysis of these Reports will assist in the evaluation process of the Meeting.
- 8.3 Financial penalties may be imposed on the Organiser for unacceptable reports in the areas of evaluation indicated in 8.1 above.
- 8.4 An IWC Meeting receiving four (4) or more 'Unacceptable' grades over two consecutive years may not be granted IWC status for the following year.

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# IAAF HAMMER THROW CHALLENGE



## REGULATIONS 2013

### 1 General Principles

- 1.1 The IAAF Hammer Throw Challenge shall be organised every year and shall be included as part of the following events:
  - meetings of the IAAF World Challenge (IWC) that have been designated by the IAAF as part of the "IAAF Hammer Throw Challenge";
  - the IAAF World Championships, every odd year.
  - Diamond League, Area Permit or other Meetings as agreed by the IAAF.
- 1.2 Regulations governing the conduct of the IAAF Hammer Throw Challenge meetings shall be issued to the IAAF Hammer Throw Challenge Meeting Organisers (Organisers) and may be amended from year to year by the IAAF.

### 2 Calendar of Events

- 2.1 Meetings to be included in the calendar of events shall be decided by the IAAF each year and confirmed to the Organisers.
- 2.2 The event can be staged either for men or for women, or both in 2013.
- 2.3 Meetings designated as part of the Hammer Throw Challenge are listed in Appendix 1.

### 3 Permit

An IAAF Hammer Throw Challenge Permit shall be issued and sent by the IAAF to the Organisers provided that this event is not part of a Meeting already receiving an IAAF Permit (ie. World Challenge Permit)

### 4 Meeting Organisers Obligations/Requirements

#### 4.1 Athletes

- 4.1.1 For each event, there shall be a minimum of 8 athletes and a maximum of 12 athletes competing.
- 4.1.2 In each event, Organisers shall accept the entry for 8 athletes ranked within the TOP 15 of the IAAF World Top List published on the IAAF website one month before the meeting.
- 4.1.3 Organisers may conduct negotiations for the appearance and promotion of athletes as follows:
  - a) through the Athletes' Member Federation;
  - b) directly with the Athletes (formal invitations shall be made through the relevant National Federations);
  - c) through duly authorised Athletes' Representatives (ARs). Organisers shall not deal with unauthorised ARs.

A complete listing of authorised ARs is available from the IAAF website <http://www.iaaf.org/athletes/athlete-representatives> or from the IAAF HQ.



4.1.5 Sanctions may be applied to the Organisers if they do not abide by the above procedure.

#### 4.2 IAAF Delegates

4.2.1 Should the event be staged outside of the IAAF World Challenge and a Technical Delegate has not been appointed by the responsible governing body, the IAAF may appoint a Delegate with the required technical knowledge to attend the event, who will serve as its official representative.

4.2.2 Should the event be staged within an IAAF World Challenge Meeting, the appointed IAAF Technical Delegate shall attend the competition.

4.2.3 The appointed Delegate shall submit a report on the conduct of the competition to the IAAF within two weeks after the competition.

#### 4.3 Technical Requirements

Organisers must provide all conditions for the ratification of a World Record: certified facilities including the cage, qualified judges, etc.

#### 4.4 Medical and Doping Control

4.4.1 Organisers shall provide adequate Medical and Emergency Services on site, including emergency assistance, ambulance service, and minor stitching.

4.4.2 Organisers shall carry out doping controls as advice by the IAAF in accordance with its Rules and Regulations.

4.4.3 The analyses shall be conducted at the WADA Accredited Laboratory appointed by the IAAF or governing body.

4.4.4 All costs relating to doping control shall be borne by the Organisers.

### 5 **Ranking**

5.1 In order to be ranked, an athlete must participate in at least three events. Although the athlete can participate in as many meets as chosen within the competitions listed in Appendix 1.

5.2 Only the best three results count towards the ranking. Scoring will be based on total aggregate performances.

5.2 The winner of the IAAF Hammer Throw Challenge will be the athlete who will have the highest score by adding his/her best three performances.

5.3 In the case of a tie in the ranking, it will be resolved in favour of the athlete who has achieved the best performance during any meeting of the Challenge.

5.4 Any Athlete achieving a new (and ratified) World Record will be awarded a bonus of 1m to be added to the total of his/her best three results. In case of an equalled World Record, the bonus will be 0.50m

### 6 **Awards**

6.1 For each meeting, the Organisers shall provide the following minimum prize money structure (\$8,500 for each event, Men and Women):

1 <sup>st</sup> place:	\$2,500	5 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$700
2 <sup>nd</sup> place:	\$2,000	6 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$600
3 <sup>rd</sup> place:	\$1,000	7 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$500
4 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$ 800	8 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$400

6.2 The IAAF will pay overall prize money of a total amount of US\$202,000 for the Men and Women IAAF Hammer Throw Challenge winners as follows:

1 <sup>st</sup> place:	\$30,000	7 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$4,500
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2 <sup>nd</sup> place:	\$20,000	8 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$4,000
3 <sup>rd</sup> place:	\$14,000	9 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$3,000
4 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$ 9,000	10 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$2,000
5 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$ 7,000	11 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$1,000
6 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$ 6,000	12 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$ 500

- 6.3 Any athlete who renders him/herself ineligible due to any infringement of IAAF Regulations will not receive any award. In such case, prize money will be paid to the next ranked athlete.
- 6.4 Awards from the IAAF will be distributed in accordance with IAAF Rules and Regulations.

## **5 Disputes**

All disputes and protests related to the competition will be considered by the IAAF.

# IAAF RACE WALKING CHALLENGE



## REGULATIONS 2013

### 1 General Principles

- 1.1 Every year, the IAAF shall organise the "IAAF Race Walking Challenge" which, for 2013, shall consist of qualified scoring events contested at competitions that have been designated as part of the "IAAF Race Walking Challenge" and divided into the following categories:
  - Cat. A: IAAF World Championships
  - Cat. B: IAAF Permit Race Walking Meetings
  - Cat. C: AREA Championships and selected Permit Race Walking Meetings;
- 1.2 Regulations governing the conduct of the IAAF Race Walking Challenge shall be issued to the Race Walking Challenge Organisers (Organisers) and may be amended from year to year by the IAAF.

### 2 Calendar of Events

- 2.1 The Calendar of Events shall be coordinated by the IAAF each year.
- 2.2 The 2013 Calendar of competitions designated as part of the Challenge, divided into the three categories, is listed in Appendix 1.

### 3 Applications/Permits

- 3.1 An Application for a Permit shall be sent by the IAAF to the Organisers prior to the season.
- 3.2 Organisers shall return the Application to the IAAF by 15 December 2012 duly completed and countersigned by the IAAF Member Federation of the country where the IAAF Race Walking Challenge is to be organised.

### 4 Obligations of the Organisers of Category B Competitions

#### 4.1 Athletes

- 4.1.1 For each event contested, a selected panel of 15 athletes based on the agreed criteria shall be entitled to receive financial support from the Organisers as detailed below. The panel with the full list of athletes for each event can be found in Appendix 2.
- 4.1.2 Financial support shall be provided as follows:
  - a) Organisers shall accept an entry and provide economy class travel and full-board accommodation (for a maximum of 4 nights) for 8 athletes on condition that entries are received no later than 2 weeks the day before the competition.
  - b) Organisers shall provide full-board accommodation (for a maximum of 4 nights) for an additional 7 athletes on condition that entries are received no later than 4 weeks the day before the competition.
- 4.1.3 Organisers may conduct negotiations for the appearance and promotion of athletes as follows:
  - a) through the Athletes' National Federation
  - b) directly with the Athletes (formal invitations shall be made through relevant National Federations)
  - c) through duly authorised Athletes Representatives (ARs). Organisers shall

not deal with unauthorised ARs.

A complete listing of authorised ARs is available from the IAAF website or from the IAAF HQ: <http://www.iaaf.org/athletes/athlete-representatives>.

## 4.2 IAAF Delegates / IAAF Staff

### 4.2.1 Delegates and Staff

- An IAAF/AIMS grade “A” or “B” International Road Race Course Measurer should be on site during the competition to certify that the course used is the one that was measured.
- At least 6 International Race Walking Judges (representing 5 countries) including the Chief Judge must be on duty. Notwithstanding their final number, all acting Judges must be chosen from either the International or Area Race Walking Judges Panels (IRWJ and ARWJ respectively). This list must be sent to the IAAF.
- The IAAF shall appoint a Delegate with the required technical knowledge to attend the event, who will serve as its official representative.

### 4.2.2 Travel and Accommodation

- Organisers are responsible for the travel and full-board accommodation of all Judges and of the Course Measurer.
- Organisers are responsible for the travel and full-board accommodation of the IAAF Delegate appointed to the competition for a maximum of 3 nights.
- Organisers are responsible for the accommodation costs of one IAAF Staff Member for a maximum of 2 nights.

### 4.2.3 Responsibilities

The IAAF Delegate shall submit a report on the conduct of the competition to the IAAF within two weeks after the end of the competition.

## 4.3 Technical Requirements

4.3.1 The events may take place on road or on the track, but must be over the following standard distances:

4.3.2 For Road Events, the Organisers must abide by IAAF Rules 230.10 and 240.3.

4.3.3 A transponder service must be in place for the timing and the lap counting.

4.3.4 At least three days before the Meeting, the Organiser shall provide the IAAF with the provisional Entry List.

## 4.4 Medical and Doping Control

4.4.1 Organisers shall provide adequate Medical and Emergency Services on site; including emergency assistance, ambulance service, and minor stitching.

4.4.2 Organisers shall carry out doping controls in accordance with the IAAF Rules and Regulations as follows:

- a) a minimum of 6 doping control tests, all including EPO analysis;
- b) the analyses shall be conducted at the WADA Accredited Laboratory appointed by the IAAF;
- c) all costs relating to doping control shall be borne by the Organisers.

The IAAF Anti-Doping Rules and Regulations are available for downloading from the IAAF website: <http://www.iaaf.org/antidoping/rules/prohibited/index.html>

#### 4.5 General Requirements

- 4.5.1 Organisers shall take out an appropriate insurance policy covering Public Liability and accidental injury to athletes and officials.
- 4.5.2 Organisers shall make every effort to arrange Television coverage of the competition, at least in the host country.
- 4.5.3 Each Meeting shall provide the IAAF with a broadcast quality video-tape (DVcam, XDcam, HDcam or DigiBeta) of the entire coverage of the competition and allow the IAAF to use up to five minutes of footage for promotional purposes, free of charge. The tape should be received by IAAF within two weeks of the competition.
- 4.5.4 Media and television facilities shall be set up in accordance with the IAAF Guidelines.
- 4.5.5 Organisers must provide the IAAF with the following:
  - a) within two hours, the full results of the competition
  - b) within two weeks after the competition, a post event report
  - c) no later than 24 hours after the competition, results will be posted on the IAAF website
- 4.5.6 Organisers shall display, at their own cost, at least one IAAF board or banner (6m x 1m) in the Finish Line area (exact layout to be provided by the IAAF).
- 4.5.7 Organisers shall also display the IAAF name and logo on all printed material (bulletin, leaflet, starts list, results, etc.) and shall provide at no cost to the IAAF, a one page IAAF advertisement in the official programme (logo and advertisement to be provided by the IAAF).

### 5 **Area Permit Race Walking Meetings**

- 5.1 Participation at selected Area Permit Race Walking Meetings can also award points towards the Challenge rankings.
- 5.2 For such Area Meetings to be considered for inclusion in the Race Walking Challenge, the following conditions shall apply:
  - 5.2.1 the IAAF must receive the relevant Application Form by 31 December 2012.
  - 5.2.2 there must be no clash of date with existing Category A or B events.
  - 5.2.3 the course must be measured by an IAAF/AIMS Grade “A” or “B” International Road Race Course Measurer.
  - 5.2.4 a minimum of 3 International or Area Race Walking Judges (representing at least 2 countries) must be on duty.
  - 5.2.5 a minimum of 4 doping control tests must be carried out.
- 5.3 The IAAF reserves the right to accept or reject the application.
- 5.4 The list of Area Permit Race Walking Meetings included in the Race Walking Challenge will be published on the IAAF website by 15 January 2013.

### 6 **Area Race Walking Championships / Cups**

- 6.1 Participation at the Area's Official Race Walking Championships or Cup shall also award points towards the Challenge rankings without the need for any application to be submitted.
- 6.2 Points to the Top 6 finishers shall be awarded according to Category C.
- 6.3 The list of designated Area Official Competitions for 2013 can be found in Appendix 1.

## 7 Ranking

- 7.1 Athletes shall be able to score points depending on the Category of the competition and the ranking shall be established according to the following scoring system:

- 7.2 To be ranked, an athlete must participate in at least three scoring events of the Challenge (of any category). Disqualified athletes (DQ), will NOT be considered as having participated in that event. Although he may compete in as many competitions as he wishes, the athlete shall be ranked only according to his best three scoring results.
- 7.3 Any athlete achieving a new World Record (on tracks or road) shall be awarded 4 bonus points in addition to the ones he shall receive as a result of his finishing position.
- 7.4 The Final standings of the Challenge shall be established after the last event of the Challenge, which is the IAAF World Championships Moscow 2013. The 12 men and 12 women with the highest number of points (subject to clauses 7.2 and 7.5) shall be eligible for the Overall Challenge Awards (see 8.3).
- 7.5 In case of a tie for the final standings of the Challenge, this shall be resolved in favour of the Race Walker with the highest finishing position in any of his best three scoring events. In case of further tie(s), the other finishing positions shall determine the ranking.

## 8 Awards

- 8.1 **Awards at the IAAF World Championships** provided by the IAAF (\$150,000 for each race):

1 <sup>st</sup> place:	\$60,000	5 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$10,000
2 <sup>nd</sup> place:	\$30,000	6 <sup>th</sup> place:	\$ 6,000

8.5 Awards from the IAAF shall be distributed in accordance with the IAAF Rules and Regulations.

**9 Disputes**

All disputes and protests related to the competition shall be resolved by the IAAF Council in collaboration with the IAAF Race Walking Committee.
